We have tried an approach to education which extends beyond textbooks, nurturing well-rounded individuals poised for a positive future.



Where the laughter and dreams of young boys echos through the corridors, a new initiative has taken root, transforming the Boys' Home into not just a sanctuary of education but a lush oasis of greenery. The Boys' Home, known for its commitment to the holistic development of its residents, has recently planted a variety of fruit trees within its premises. It serves as an invaluable educational tool, teaching the boys about the environment, agriculture, and the interconnectedness of nature. They have planted 50 different Mango varieties, 30 Guava and 25 Indian Plum.

From the Director's Desk



Dear Friends,

I hope and pray that you and your family are doing well.

Our schooling session was started in the month of June and we have 205 boys enrolled in the boys' school and at the girls' school we have 488 girls. In Frank Juelich Pre-Primary English Medium School we have 21 students, in Roger Stronstad High School 152 students, and in Adiwasi Academy Primary School 157 students. All together 887 children are under our care for schooling for this academic session.

As schools have re-opened after the Diwali festival break of two weeks, regular school activities are taking place. In the Christmas season all the kids had good time and enjoyed the festivities. Our schools organized various events for children including various sports activities as well as dance and skits for our annual cultural celebration.

Last summer we made 100Kgs (220 Pounds) of pickles from the fruit of our garden's two mango trees. We are serving these pickles to our kids for supper from time to time. This year we have 50 mango of different varieties, 30 Vietnamese Guavas and 25 Indian plum trees in our field. We are looking forward to future fruits for our kids! Our future plan is to plant various fruit plants in the open field and grow vegetables for the boys - as we are now growing vegetables in small scale for the boys' school.

I seek your blessings and prayers for our various needs which will enable us to provide improve facilities for education, accommodation and a health care facility for our girls' school.

My last Canada visit was good and I want to thank each and every one who helped me in need and in deed as required and thank you for opening the doors to share about our work.

On the 22nd of January we lost Malji Raut, Yohan's elder brother, to pneumonia. Malji was faithfully looking after the girls' school with his wife Yamuna for many years. We ask the you please keep their family and all our girls' school staff and students in your prayers.

I am so appreciative of your generosity and continuous support for our boys' and girls' schools over the years and look forward to your support to improve necessary facilities for the kids.
